From Moral Relativism to Tolerance

1 Vulgar Relativism

- 1. 'Right' means 'right for a given society.'
- 2. 'Right for a given society' is to be understood in functionalist terms.
- 3. Therefore, it is wrong for the members of one society to condemn or interfere with the values of another society.

2 How many justified moral beliefs are there?

- I. Moral Relativism: *lots*. Each society has its own set that is correct for its members.
- 2. Moral Universalism: *some*. There's only one true set for everyone, regardless of what the members of different societies believe.
- 3. Moral Nihilism: none. There are no justified moral beliefs.

3 Undermining reasons for intolerance

3.1 Conservative formulation

- I. A is justified in interfering with B on the basis of its moral code only if its moral code is correct. [Platitude¹]
- 2. Suppose moral relativism is true: each society has its own standards of morality that are correct for its members. [Definition]
- 3. Therefore, the members of A would be wrong to think that their moral code is correct and a conflicting one is incorrect. [From 2]
- 4. Therefore, the members of different societies should not interfere with one another on the basis of their moral codes: they have no reason to do so. [From 1-3]

¹Note. This is a *necessary* condition of justifiably interfering, not a *sufficient* one. Interfering might be stupid or wrong even if this is true.

3.2 Revisionary formulation

- I. A is justified in interfering with B on the basis of its moral code only if its moral code is correct. [same as above]
- 2. A's moral code is correct only if it is correct for both A and B. [new premise]
- 3. Suppose moral relativism is true: each society has its own standards of morality that are correct for its members. [same as above]
- 4. Therefore, the members of A would be wrong to think that their moral code is correct and a conflicting one is incorrect. [same as above]
- 5. Therefore, the members of different societies should not interfere with one another on the basis of their moral codes: they have no reason to do so. [same as above]
