GOALS

The centerpiece of this course is a literature review on a topic of your choosing. A literature review summarizes and evaluates the scholarly literature on a topic. The summary should identify what the major ideas in the literature are and how they are related to one another. A literature review involves evaluation in two ways. First, you have to exercise judgment in deciding which works are important enough to be included in the review. Second, you should seek to identify significant limitations in the works under review. At the end of the term, you

should be able to explain both the major positions taken by scholars writing on your topic and also the chief strengths and weaknesses of those positions.

Having completed the literature review, you will have done the senior project required to graduate as a philosophy major. You will *also* be in a position to write a senior thesis in the spring; having done a critical review of the scholarly literature, you will be able to forge ahead with a contribution of your own.

GRADES

Grades will be based on the final paper (50%), three oral presentations (35%), and the précis and reading list (15%).

There are nine weekly précis. These should cover between one large or two smaller pieces of writing by a professional philosopher such as an article in a scholarly journal or a chapter in a book published by a university press.

Attendance is mandatory. You aren't getting the value of the seminar unless you attend the sessions. Of course, reasonable accommodations will be made.

All written work should be posted to your dropbox on Sakai. Late work will be penalized at the rate of .25 points per day late. If you turn in four précis one day late, for example, that part of the final grade will be reduced by one point. The point of weekly writing assignments is to keep you on track to finish your research report comfortably by the end of the term. That aim would be defeated if we did not have meaningful due dates.
